WHAT IS THE SCIENCE OF READING?

The science of reading is evidence from the accumulation of five decades of research about reading acquisition and instruction that has been conducted using gold-standard methodologies. This evidence has:

- Established our understanding of how students learn to read
- Identified effective instructional practices
- Clarified instruction for students who have difficulty learning to read

Research from the science of reading shows proven ways students can become proficient readers and learners across the curriculum. Using the tenets of Structured Literacy, instruction aligned with the science of reading benefits all students and is essential for those with reading difficulties.

Proficient reading comprehension relies on automatic associations of sounds and letters. Repeated exposure to letter patterns when reading and spelling words builds letter patterns and words in memory and develops accurate decoding and spelling skills.

WHAT VOYAGER PASSPORT DOES

Students learn the reliable and frequently recurring patterns required to match sounds to letters or groups of letters (e.g., digraphs, diphthongs). Students are taught the six orthographic syllable types—closed, open, silent-e, vowel-r, vowel pairs, and consonant-lethat facilitate the accurate recognition of monosyllabic and multisyllabic words. They are also taught the four major syllable division patterns in English: VCCV, VCV, VCCCV, and VV.

Daily instruction includes phonological awareness activities during the Word Works portion of the daily lesson with more emphasis in the lower grades according to essential priority needs (in levels A and B). Voyager Passport follows an evidence-based, sequential progression of phonological skills from syllable counting, rhyming, and alliteration to identifying individual phonemes for blending and segmenting the spoken word.
